Here are David's recollections of the visit......



Thursday May 26th

A party of eight Rotarians some accompanied by partners, making a total of eleven visited Erlangen from the 26th to 29th May.

We travelled by different routes and modes of transport and in spite of some delays on the way we all got to Erlangen in time for the gala dinner on Thursday evening. Jan Dash unfortunately fell and broke her nose and wrist at Berlin airport, in spite of that she made the most of the trip.

Diana and Nigel's travel plans were frustrated by having to spend a night in a hotel at Schiphol airport.

The welcome dinner was held in a lovely fish restaurant Fish Kitchen Nutzel on a fish farm about 5km out of Erlangen. It was a nice sunny evening and Janet and I were lucky enough to be taken there in a perfect 1960s Jaguar belonging to Thomas from Erlangen. After excellent food we had some short welcome speeches and started to reacquaint old friendships and make new friends.

Friday May 27th

The Schloss was interesting because it was a former castle converted into a ducal family house. It was the birth place of Prince Albert.
